Should I travel with my pet this summer?

Be sure to do your research and work with your veterinarian.

Make sure you also have ID tags with your name, contact information and the pet's name, microchip, tattoo or other license information, and maybe even a picture or description of your pet just in case the unthinkable would happen and your pet becomes lost in an unfamiliar place.

Make sure your dog is well socialized and knows basic commands and walks well on a leash before taking him into unfamiliar surroundings and finding that you have an unruly or anxious dog who is difficult to control.

You want to a look up a veterinarian or emergency clinic and maybe even a kennel near your destination. Having a backup plan for your pet is also a good idea should plans or travel policies change before your trip.
